Data is used to facilitate online curriculum, but it is also strictly protected by Weber School District. This disclosure statement explains how the data is collected and used, and what options parents have in relation to their student's information.



- The School District will not collect any student data that is restricted by federal or state laws, such as the child's social security number or criminal record.
- Weber School District will not share student data without authorization, and all data will be collected within the scope of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) and related provisions under 20 U.S.C. §§ 1232(g) and 1232(h).
- Students own their own personally identifiable information
 - A student may download, export, transfer, save, or maintain their own record
 - The district will immediately notify the student and guardian if a data security breach is detected
- Student Data will be collected by the district in the following ways
 - Registration forms filled out by a parent or legal guardian
 - Authorization forms sent out to parents or legal guardians
- Parents may opt-out of any form of data collection or sharing

Weber School District: Student Data Disclosure Statement

The collection, use, and sharing of student data has both benefits and risks. Parents and students should learn about these benefits and risks and make choices regarding student data accordingly.

Weber School District strives to be clear about what data we collect on students, how data supports your child's education, and the safeguards in place to protect that data.

What Data Do We Collect and Why?

	<h3>Necessary Data</h3> <p>Necessary student data is data that is required by the statute or federal law to conduct regular activities. It includes, but is not limited to, name, date of birth, sex, parent contact information, student ID, assessment results, courses taken, grade, attendance, immunization records, and race.</p>		<h3>Optional Data</h3> <p>We collect optional data also, which is data that is not necessary or restricted. Data that falls into this category includes IEP and special needs information, biometric information, and information that is required for a student to participate in a federal or other program.</p>
<h3>Information that cannot be shared</h3> <p>Certain information is considered "restricted" and cannot be shared without an authorization form. This data includes personally identifiable information: name, address, phone, contact information, date of birth, and other information that would make the student identifiable.</p>		<h3>Protecting Data</h3> <p>We go to great measures to ensure all data is securely stored and protected. Physical security is available at all data center locations, and authorization to enter the center is limited. Authentication is also required to access any and all student data records within the school district.</p>

Students need feedback on their progress so they can make good decisions about program choices and prepare for success.

School Officials and community members need to understand school performance and know if scarce education resources are being allocated fairly and effectively.

How is Educational Data Protected?

We follow federal and state education privacy laws and adhere to privacy and security policies.

The Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) gives parents the rights related to their children's education records and personally identifiable information. Additional information is available in our annual notice to parents of their rights under FERPA and from the U.S. Department of Education at their website : <http://familypolicy.ed.gov>

When we use an online service provider to process or store data, they also must adhere to certain federal and state privacy laws. We also expect them to use current security protocols and technology

The federal Children's Online Privacy Protection Act (COPPA) prevents child-directed websites and apps from collecting certain personal information from anyone under 13 years of age without parental permission. Weber School District may consent on behalf of parents in the education context when student information is collected for the school's exclusive use and benefit and for no other commercial purpose.

Under FERPA, our vendors cannot use the education records we provide in any way that is not authorized by Weber School District. They cannot sell this data or allow others to access it except as we permit in accordance with federal and state education privacy laws.

Our Commitment

We are working to improve your children's education by ensuring it meets their unique needs. It would be very difficult to accomplish this goal without the ability to capture important information about your child's progress. Protecting personal information in secure and responsible ways is at the heart of our efforts to provide a richer and more dynamic learning experience for all students.
